HAVE YOUR SAY!

We would like to say a huge thank you to the parents who took the time to complete the survey about communication in the last edition of Cornerstones. Your views are very important to us and help us make things better for everyone within our school community.

93% of parents found the various types communications from the school helpful and 96% of parents felt that a half termly newsletter was about right.

59% of parents felt they were provided with enough information to understand how their child was behaving in school and 78% of parents felt they had enough information to understand what their child is learning.

81% of parents have used the Edulink One app, with the majority finding the homework section the most helpful.

63% of parents would find text messages helpful and 30% of parents would like more information through Facebook.

We have listened to your comments and some of the changes we are putting in place include:

- Amending the emails alerts that are sent home to inform you of a sanction to explain a little more about the reasons for the sanction.
- A regular article in the Cornerstones bulletin to provide more information about the Edulink one app.
- Moving towards a system that allows text message alerts for those parents who would like this.
- Regular review of parents' evenings to ensure we meet the needs of all. Currently parents are divided on whether they prefer face to face or virtual meetings, therefore we are offering a blended approach through the year groups.
- An opportunity in the summer term for parents who haven't visited school due to Covid to visit for a tour round.

EDULINK ONE

In September, we launched the use of the EduLink One app with staff. We have since given parents access to the app to be able to see timetables, homework, and the personal data we hold for students. We have had some very positive feedback about the ability to see homework and being able to better support children at home. Although we have not yet demonstrated this to students, we are planning to roll this out with them over the remainder of this year. We are also exploring some of the additional features within EduLink which may be of benefit to parents, carers, students and staff, and may also help to reduce the use of multiple systems.



Following the communication survey, some parents have commented that a red cross is showing next to homework tasks which makes it look like the task has not been handed in. This is a feature that links to the student accounts and is an indicator for the students to use so they know which tasks they still must complete. The red cross is not an indicator from teaching staff of incomplete homework. The student planners, in-line with the behaviour for learning policy, will remain central to communicating any issues with homework.

We will continue to keep parents and carers updated as we add in any additional features and launch the app with students.

Those attending also had the opportunity to attend two revision workshops of their choice. However, the real focus of the event was to share revision tips with students and provide parents/carers with some ideas around how they can support their child with preparation for the GCSE exams. Y7 SETTLING IN CELEBRATIONS

Thursday 2nd and Monday 6th March saw the return of our formal celebration events at Driffield School and Sixth form. The events were to recognise and reward the fantastic efforts of our current Year 7 cohort. We understand the challenge of our 260 students, across 10 feeder primary schools, have transitioning to the a large secondary and we felt it appropriate to celebrate their efforts after nearly 6 months with us.



There were 3 main awards across the events. Firstly, two students from each form were nominated by their form tutor and our tutors were able to be present at the event to articulate why they had nominated their students before handing them a certificate. WELLBEING

BE WELL

We are pleased to confirm that all students in the school will now benefit from our unique Be Well programme by taking part in a series of workshops. Each year group will benefit from one workshop per year to support good mental health and wellbeing. Year 11 students have already had a workshop called 'School life and Stress' and the feedback was extremely positive. Students found the strategies very helpful as they start of prepare for exams and the next steps in their education.

The workshops for Year 7 to 9 students will take place this half term and are as follows:

Self-esteem and confidence: Year 9

We work to understand what Self-Esteem and Confidence are and how they are linked to our mental health, explore how these can be impacted and what we can do to build them up. We finish the session looking at positive affirmations and the power of compliments.

Ways to wellbeing: Year 8

We look at the five areas research has found improves our wellbeing. Discuss how these can be incorporated into our life, and identify those areas we need to improve. We play wellbeing bingo, do activities to connect to others and have group discussions.

Transition and self-care: Year 7

Focusing on the transition to secondary school but also discussing other times of change during a life time, and how this can affect us.

Working in groups to find ways that we can look after ourselves during times of change, and introducing the five ways to wellbeing.



APEX CURRICULUM

The APEX programme at Driffield School is designed to develop students into well informed members of our community, ready to tackle risks within society. The key topic for this term is Risk and Safety. This unit will inform students about some of the dangers they may face online, in day-to-day life and in the wider world.

Students in Year 7 will have an opportunity to explore how to stay safe online and gain an understanding of some of the dangers associated with social media. Year 8 lessons have a greater focus on risks in society. Topics include county lines, gambling, vaping and knife crime. Students in Year 9 will look at risks related to human trafficking, exploitation and extremism.

In Key Stage 4 lessons this term students will be exploring units linked to religious studies and the wider world. Year 10 will study whether we should harm living creatures as well as investigating how religion is portrayed in the media. Year 11 will discuss religion and conflict.

As always, our Head of APEX works closely with the pastoral team to ensure all students are supported throughout the delivery of these lessons. If you do, however, have any concerns, please contact your child's Head of Year.

TOM FISHER - ASSISTANT HEADTEACHER

I am Mr Fisher, Assistant Headteacher for Personal Development and Behaviour and Teacher of PE. I moved to Yorkshire five years ago from Bristol and have loved working at Driffield School ever since. Driffield is a wonderful place to come and work with a strong sense of community and kindness.

When I first joined Driffield School, I continued the work around Personal, Social, Health education by developing APEX (Achieving Personal Excellence) The reason I have so much passion for this subject is because students are at the heart of it. They have a big say on what content should be covered and how. We are all hugely passionate about ensuring young people have the knowledge and skills to equip them for a happy, healthy and safe future.

As I oversee personal development at Driffield, I want to ensure that young people have the very best personal development education they can. I want to ensure they hear from people outside of the staff they daily see, have opportunities to contribute on areas they are passionate about, can attend clubs that increases health and happiness, can access opportunities that might not be possible outside of school and raise their future aspirations. Over the past twelve months, I have led the largest national study of its kind with Citizens UK to tackle the "normalised" sexual abuse in schools. We hope, with the support of over 150,000 young people, we can drive about change in attitudes and legislation.

My other major passion is sport and still being able to teach PE at Driffield is wonderful. Students at Driffield get such a great offer from all the clubs, fixtures, trips and experiences that are available. Outside of school, I have now retired from national league hockey and instead enjoy triathlons, surfing and spending time with friends and family. I encourage everyone to take up a new interest, sporting or not and keep going with it. It will bring you a lifetime of happiness, health, friendships and memories.
