Upcoming Events in APEX this half term

This half term we are welcoming The Road Safety team from Humberside Fire and Rescue into Driffield School. They will be delivering assemblies to all students explaining the importance of driver safety, even when you are a passenger. Students will develop this knowledge further when they study this topic in APEX in the next half term. They will look at the impact of phones, alcohol and driving in a dangerous manner when behind the wheel.



Throughout last half term several groups of Year 7 pupils visited the sixth form at Kingsmill School. They explored the classrooms and worked alongside Kingsmill staff to understand the daily routines and day to day life of the students. They worked in groups and took part in activities that gave them an insight into how a disability affects a person's everyday life. Some of our students have been learning sign language so they are able to communicate with the pupils. Over the next few weeks students from both Driffield School and Kingsmill School will be working together on some activities. This opportunity to develop links between the two schools has been hugely rewarding and we look forward to working on more projects together in the future.

SPOTLIGHT ON...

HOLLY ROBINSON - CAREERS GUIDANCE LEAD

My name is Holly Robinson and I am the Careers Guidance Lead at Driffield School. I work with students across the school from Year 7 to Year 13 to support them in their career choices. A large part of my job involves meeting with students on an individual basis or in small groups to explore their future plans and to make sure that they have had the right information to make informed decisions. Another side of my role is to develop relationships with local employers and education/training providers so that I can provide students with up to date information and contacts. I also work closely with Mrs Mortimer (Careers Leader) to organise a variety of careers events and activities both inside and outside of school.

Prior to moving into Careers Guidance, I have a varied background of experience. I worked for many years as an Animal Management lecturer and Team Leader, and worked on a range of conservation projects in Africa, before moving into a role at Yorkshire Wildlife Trust supporting young people into conservation related careers. More recently, I worked for East Riding of Yorkshire Council on youth employability projects, supporting young people who were not in education, training or employment.

I have always enjoyed working with young people, and my favourite parts of my job are helping students to explore the range of possibilities and to aim high, as well as seeing students progressing with their career plans, moving on to exciting new jobs, apprenticeships or courses.



STUDENT LEADERS

UPDATE

The end of the Autumn term was a busy one for the student leaders.

On Monday 11 December the student leadership team visited South Hunsley School to take part in the inaugural Student Leader conference. The day was arranged to allow the student leaders from all of our trust schools to get together, discuss their work, share ideas and make plans for how they are going to continue to improve the lives of they young people at their schools.

During the day they took part in a session delivered by Jo Brassington, a well renowned primary school teacher who promotes embracing diversity in our schools. He also led a session with the students on how our schools can be supportive and inclusive places for all students.

They also took part in a workshop around leadership and how they can have a positive influence on the young people around them. The day culminated in the leaders discussing what they had gained form the day and then coming up with some action plans to take back to school. It was a fantastic day which the students took a lot from and it was fabulous to see them all working together to make a positive impact in their schools. We are very much looking forward to implementing these plans in the coming weeks.

On Wednesday 20 December a group form the student leadership team visited the Riverhead care home to sing some carols and spread some Christmas cheers. This has become an annual event and was very much enjoyed by the students and the residents present. It was a fabulous way to end the year, and was such a success that we have been invited to sing for the residents at Easter this year as well as next Christmas.



ANTI-BULLYING

Our anti-bullying work continues to have a high profile across the school, with work taking place in assemblies, form time and in APEX lessons.

Following on from our involvement in the national anti-bullying week in November, during which our Peer Mentors developed a pledge which was signed by all students during Form Time, we have identified spaces where these will be prominently displayed in school. These displays will be a visible demonstration of our shared commitment:



ANTI-BULLYING

We are continuing to work alongside the Antibullying Alliance. Students will soon take part in a final survey which will help us in measuring the impact of our antibullying work in school. This survey, alongside a thorough audit completed by senior staff and our antibullying coordinator Mrs Jude, will allow us to evaluate our strengths as a school and identify any ways in which we can further support any young person who is affected by bullying of any kind. Pleasingly, the previous survey completed by students demonstrated that students know how to report any instances of bullying, who they can report it to and showed a very good understanding of the impact that bullying can have on a person. We are never complacent, however, and look forward to analysing the information we gain from our students in this upcoming exercise.

Our 'Chat and Chill', a provision operated by Mrs Jude on a daily basis, remains a busy space during lunchtimes. Here, students can speak to staff, peer mentors and friends. Peer Mentors now have specific allocated roles to manage this space and it is great to see so many students enjoying being here.





As a whole school community, we are proactive and relentless in our anti-bullying work. We know that 'pupils are happy at the school and say that it feels safe', telling us that 'if bullying happens, it is quickly dealt with' (OFSTED), but we are never complacent regarding bullying and strongly urge students and parents to contact us should any concerns arise. Our pastoral team are always on hand to support young people and we will always remain in contact with parents and carers following any reports of bullying. We are One Driffield; bullying is not tolerated in our school, and we are so pleased to have so many students working with us to ensure that this remains the case.

CORNERSTONES

Driffield School's expectations are built upon our four 'Cornerstones' and these are the foundations for our community: Care, Respect, Responsibility and Perseverance.

We are always thrilled to be able to celebrate our students' achievements and, at the end of each half term, Mrs Loftus meets with the 10 students who have been awarded the most Cornerstones Stamps. It is a pleasure to hear about the occasions on which they have earned their stamps by living the values that we promote every day at school. Congratulations go to our most recent Cornerstones Champions!



Students and staff continue to benefit from consistent routines in lessons, ensuring that students know exactly how to 'get it right' and earn rewards, making it easy for them to behave well and difficult not to! Your child has been taught a specific routine in each subject during half term one, two and three and will see these routines used across the school.

We always seek the views of our students and are pleased that their feedback remains very positive, with students telling us: 'I like that they're about more than just school work and subjects because it's important to get rewarded for the important real life stuff too', 'The routines help because you just get into good habits of what to do to have good lessons, you don't even think about it anymore your lessons just start well and you know exactly what to do in them'

As we continuously look to develop and improve, we are currently designing routines which will support visiting staff. These routines will ensure that our students enjoy consistent, purposeful lessons regardless of which staff member they are working with and will be of benefit to staff who are visiting the school.
