What is Literacy?

- Literacy encompasses reading, writing, speaking and listening skills.
- These are all essential for academic success and everyday life





BE YOUR BEST Reading requires two skills:

Phonics and Word Recognition

- The ability to recognise words presented in and out of context.
- The ability to blend letter sounds (phonemes) together to read words.



Understanding

The ability to understand the meaning of the words and sentences in a text.

The ability to understand the ideas, information and themes in a text.

If a child understands what they hear, they will understand the same information when they read.





What is reading?

<u>Understanding</u> (Comprehension)

- Being able to read does not mean you understand what you read
- •Your child might sound like a good reader but may not necessarily understand what the text means.
- •The best way to develop understanding is to talk about texts.

<u>Understanding Challenges</u>

Early signs of literacy difficulties can include:

- Frustration with reading
- Poor spellings
- Reluctance to write
- Avoidance









Strategies to support when reading

- Encourage your child to repeat what they read and say it back to them does the word "sound right" especially if it is a familiar word.
- Quick comprehension check literal retrieval of facts / details.
- Vocabulary definitions don't assume they know what it means.
- Celebrate small achievements keep them motivated
- Stay involved
