RE: Key information for the start of term

As the school year draws to an end, plans and preparations for the new school year are well underway and I am writing to provide you with some key information for September 2026.

First Day Arrangements

Year 7 and Year 12 students will return to school on Tuesday 8 September with all year groups attending from Wednesday 9 September. Our new Year 7 cohort have received a separate letter from Mr Fisher outlining the arrangements for their first day. All year groups will be asked to go to their tutor rooms for period 1 for extended tutor time. During this time, tutors will welcome students back to school, provide them with their timetables for the new academic year and ensure they fully understand our expectations, routines and procedures. In addition, students will also learn of the content planned for the year relating to personal development themes, with a continued focus next year on the importance of character. Lessons will commence as normal from period 2.

Pastoral Arrangements

In September, students in Years 8-11 will remain with their existing Head of Year and Mrs Potter will become the Head of Year 7.

We will continue to share further information about key areas of pastoral work and student updates with you through our half termly Cornerstones publication throughout the next academic year. This will be emailed to you but if you require a hard copy, please contact the school and we will facilitate this.

Behaviour for Learning Policy

Following very positive feedback from students, parents/carers and staff on our Behaviour for Learning policy, there will be a few small changes to the language used in the policy for the next academic year. Further information on the policy can be found [here](#).

Important areas to note are as follows:

- Our school expectations have been designed to link in with our four cornerstones (care, respect, responsibility and perseverance) to help students better understand why the expectations are important and necessary.
- These expectations are reinforced through our delivery of a behaviour curriculum that is built around our four cornerstones. Through this curriculum, students will receive regular opportunities to learn about, and be reminded of, key routines that enable the smooth running of the school.
- The policy emphasises the rewarding of students who consistently make good choices and meet the school expectations.
- Consequences for disruptive behaviour are recorded separately to other more organisational issues, ensuring that students will only ever be removed from a classroom for persistent disruption.
- From September 2026, the policy reflects our move towards creating a phone-free learning environment. More information about this will follow in the new term.

The student planner remains key to our Behaviour for Learning policy and an effective communication tool between home and school. The planner includes a specific area each week which allows parents, carers or school staff to make notes or add comments. This may be useful if you need to get a note to a specific member of staff.

Uniform and Equipment

Preparing for your child's return to school in September is a good time to check your child's uniform to ensure they start the new academic year with the correct uniform and equipment. All students are expected to return to school in full school uniform, including wearing a tie. If you are unsure of the uniform requirements, you can find the full policy [here](#).

Please do check the uniform policy before making any purchases as we have made adjustments to the policy to ensure it is affordable for all. We have reduced the number of items that are required and have liaised with Drury Sports to offer an embroidery service if you would prefer to purchase items from other retailers.

Please be aware that items of uniform offered by some high street retailers may not meet the requirements for our dress code, even if they are labelled as 'school wear'. If you are in any doubt about the suitability of any item (especially trousers or shoes) please check with your child's Head of Year.

You may be aware that we have a pre-owned uniform shop. This enables parents and carers to purchase pre-used, good condition uniform at a considerably lower cost through the year. With this in mind, if you have any items of uniform that you would like to donate, it will be gratefully received through ACE reception.

Please be aware that piercings, other than one pair of earrings, are not permitted as part of the uniform policy. Therefore, if your child is planning to have any piercings done over the summer holidays it must be towards the start of the holiday to enable them to be able to remove them for school. All piercings must be removed before students arrive at school as per the policy. The same applies to false nails, painted nails and false eyelashes.

One Driffield: Be Here

As you will be aware, the first element of our One Driffield message is to 'Be Here' and this is a vitally important message that we continue to promote with you and your children. Students who attend school regularly are able to make stronger and more lasting friendships and develop positive relationships with a wider range of the school community. They are more likely to become involved in the fantastic extra-curricular provision we offer and, ultimately, develop the skills and qualities needed to become confident young adults. Good attendance links very strongly with our cornerstone expectations, perseverance and responsibility.

Our own school data closely matches national data demonstrating that students who attend school over 95% of the time are more likely to achieve positive academic outcomes. This is true across all year groups, as any missed learning could potentially lead to gaps in knowledge that are needed to build upon at a later date.

Please bear this in mind when requesting absence for exceptional circumstances during term time. A two-week holiday during school time means that a child will not be able to achieve higher than 95% over a full year, even if they have no further absence.
